

AT LAST – AN UPDATE ON OUR TIMOR LESTE PROJECT

Due to Covid-19, Sr Anne was unable to leave Australia. However, I recently received the 'on ground' Annual Report, from Filipina Sr Gilbert Mary – via Mercy Works HQ in Sydney.

The good news is our Nutritional Education Project for mothers, babies and surrounding villagers, is still progressing. The extra protein from locally sourced chickens, eggs and fish, is making a difference.

(We raised money for these last year).

In addition the Sisters run Ante & Post-Natal groups and now a Hostel for up to 50 girls from the surrounding area, who attend school in Maucatar.

In the past year, 204 mothers were deemed 'at serious risk' of malnutrition, plus 232 children under 5 years. (1,143 children were tested.) TB, Pneumonia, Infections generally and now COVID concerns increase the need for education in good hygiene, as well as Nutrition. Difficult with a sad lack of sanitation!

The Sisters stay in touch with the mothers, holding local clinics, and travel to outer villages. (You may recall mountainous terrain and very rough roads).

Everything they do, with so little, is appreciated by the locals, especially the women.

Many in our parish are experiencing hardship at present, but adding the Timorese to your Prayer list is FREE!

This year our Timor 3rd World project is 26 years young! We can't let the Virus beat us.

I will always take your money. Or - you can put it in an envelope marked 'TIMOR', in a collection bag or in the Parish office.

I am happy to enlarge on this report.

COMPLIANCE WITH REGULATIONS

(The following conditions apply at this time)

- Attendance for mass is dependent on the 1 in 2 sq.m rule restriction.
- This number also applies for funerals and weddings.
- Except for families and household groups, people should socially distance.
- There should be no physical contact outside one's family or household group.
- There should be no shaking of hands or holding hands during the Mass.
- Every gathering must record contact details. Logs are located at the entrance to the Church.
- Hand sanitizer is to be available at church entrances.
- Precious Blood will not be distributed.
- No collection plates or hymn books are to be passed around.
- Communion is given only in hands.
- Holy Water is not available at the doors of churches.
- All surfaces should be cleaned at least daily, with special attention given to frequently touched surfaces.
- Sick and high risk/vulnerable people should be encouraged not to attend.
- Collection plates will not be passed around but a single drop point is provided at the churches.
- Offertory procession will be omitted.
- Care should be taking at the dismissal and on leaving the church to minimise social contact.
- The obligation for Sunday Mass for the laity HAS NOT BEEN RE-INVOKED at this stage.

(Continued from page 1) opinion? A man had two sons. He went and said to the first, "My boy, you go and work in the vineyard today." He answered, "I will not go," but afterwards thought better of it and went. The man then went and said the same thing to the second who answered, "Certainly, sir," but did not go. Which of the two did the father's will?' 'The first' they said. Jesus said to them, 'I tell you solemnly, tax collectors and prostitutes are making their way into the kingdom of God before you. For John came to you, a pattern of true righteousness, but you did not believe him, and yet the tax collectors and prostitutes did. Even after seeing that, you refused to think better of it and believe in him.'

DID YOU KNOW?

- The 'chief priests and elders' are the leaders of the Jewish religious community. They were the ones with training and were learned in the Scriptures. They should have known and recognised what is from God but they are like the son who says 'yes' and fails to carry out God's will.
- Prostitutes and tax collectors are often bracketed together because both were considered 'sinners': prostitutes for their sexual behaviour and tax collectors because they cooperated with the Roman authorities and cheated their own people.

EXPLORING THE WORD

A great deal has happened since last week's gospel reading in the lectionary. Jesus is now in Jerusalem. He has entered the city (Mt 21:1–11) and has taken possession of the Temple, driving out those who corrupt his Father's house (Mt 21:12–17). The crisis point of Jesus' ministry has arrived and he will enter into conflict with the established religious authorities.

The point of this text is that it is not the 'conventionally religious', who mouth all the right words and go through the rituals, who will enter the kingdom. Instead it is the ones who, by their actions, carry out God's will and so will become the sons and daughters of God. John the Baptist, like Jesus himself, not only preached righteousness, he lived it. Jesus describes him as 'a pattern of true righteousness' (Mt 21:32) and it was the broken people, the tax collectors and prostitutes, who accepted what he had to bring. They believed in him, repented and experienced a change of heart and life.

LIVING THE WORD

- Words are one thing, but deeds are another. In the long run it is deeds which count more. 'Actions speak louder than words'. More importantly, this little story tells us that change is possible, even after a negative decision. We have the ability to have second thoughts and respond generously; we can decide to do the right thing. At times, it is those who are not expected to do the right thing that surprise us!
- Who are the people in your life who inspire you because of the consistency of their vision and action?
- Sometimes it is the simple people who inspire us the most. How might you emulate their approach? Are there ways you can be an inspiration for others? Are there ways you can publicly witness to saying 'yes' or acting for justice this week?
